## Finding Mother-Friendly Childbirth Across All Birth Options

When pregnant or thinking about becoming pregnant, women might also begin to consider what they want their childbirth experience to be. Many times women do not realize they have a choice regarding health care providers, the place of birth and available support systems. One such support system is the **Coalition for Improving Maternity Services** (CIMS). CIMS is a group of individuals and national organizations whose mission is to promote a wellness model of maternity care that will improve birth outcomes and substantially reduce costs. Whether the choice of birth setting is home, high-tech hospital or anything in between, CIMS suggests that expectant women ask their care providers the following:

- Who will be with me during labor and birth?
- What happens during a normal labor and birth in your setting?
- How do you allow for differences in culture and beliefs?
- Can I walk and move around during labor?
- What positions do you suggest for birth?
- How do you make sure everything goes smoothly when my nurse, doctor, midwife or agency need to work with each other?
- What things do you normally do to a woman in labor?
- How do you help mothers stay as comfortable as they can be? Besides drugs, how do you help mothers relieve the pain of labor?
- What if my baby is born early or has special problems?
- Do you circumcise babies?
- How do you help mothers who want to breast-feed?
